OUR SCHOOL

The School and its Community

The 2018 school year was one of great achievement and celebration for our school. The Embleton area continues to go through a phase of urban renewal which brings children from all over the world to our school and we celebrate the rich diversity of cultures this brings. We enjoy the benefits of being a small school with a high level of academic achievement and pastoral care of students. Embleton is a unique and inclusive school. We are privileged to be able to host four classes of students from Durham Road. This provides an inclusive program for high functioning special needs students. This inclusion where all children play together and work together has very positive outcomes for everyone.

Embleton Primary has a supportive school community who continue to work with a professional and dedicated staff to provide the best opportunities for the children of this school. The School Council were instrumental in continuing to set the direction of the school throughout the year. The P&C although small in number, has worked tirelessly to fund a range of educational equipment, resources and events.

The programs and learning opportunities that are developed to enrich student learning would not be possible without the dedication and hard work of the staff. The level of pastoral care and the pursuit of continual improvement in teaching exhibited by members of the staff at Embleton Primary School has a major influence on the success of our students.

Our Vision

In 2018 we focused on working towards becoming an Independent Public School. This included training for staff and the community and a focus on improvement of student outcomes. After discussion with all stakeholders, our new vision Together We Make a Difference encompasses the culture and the feel of our School.

Literacy, Numeracy, Information Technologies, Science and Sustainability, were the key learning priority areas in 2018. Developing strong Community Partmerships was also a priority. Operational plans for these 4 areas were developed and the school and community worked together to complete the process of developing a new Business Plan for the school for the future.

STUDENT LEARNING



Embleton Primary School collects data about student achievement from a number of sources such as The National Assessment Program-Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN); Student Achievement Information System (SAIS); Pre-Primary On Line

Assessment Data; School Developed assessments and National School Opinion Surveys for Parents, Staff and Students. We engage in rigorous review processes, celebrating successes, reflecting on achievements and setting targets for the future with a focus on improving student learning.

NAPLAN is a measure of how Australian students are performing in Literacy (Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation) and Numeracy. It enables comparisons of student performance against nationally agreed achievement bands and a National Minimum Standard is set for all Australian schools.


In 2018, the NAPLAN data for Year 5 was based on a very small cohort of students, only five students had been here from Years 3-5 and the data doesn't accurately reflect gains made by many of our students. The 2018 student data for Year 3 was based on a higher number of students and the results were outstanding. The students achieved above expected performance in all areas.

MATHEMATICS

Embleton has a whole school approach to the teaching of Numeracy and students participate in a Numeracy Block on a daily basis. This whole school, systematic approach supported by online programs, results in students having very good mathematical ability and they continue to achieve high standards in Numeracy.



Value Adding

The stable cohort in Year 3 achieved very good results compared with their On Entry Assessment in Pre Primary. 70% of the students made High to Very High progress. The School mean was well above the Like School and State Mean. Whilst the very small stable cohort from Year 3 to Year 5 showed moderate progress, they were still just above the Like School mean.

ENGLISH

Our commitment to the Literacy block includes the explicit teaching of skills focused on Reading, Writing, Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar. The following results showed a number of strengths in all areas of Literacy in Year 5. The Year 5 results were not so strong, especially in the area of Reading. Reading continues to be a priorityhowever, this continues to be a priority.

Reading



Students in Year 5 achieved below like schools in Reading. and Year 3 students achieved results that were higher than both Like Schools and the National Mean. The stable cohort of Year 3 students were all at or above the National Minimum Standard and made Moderate to High progress from On Entry Assessment.


Value Adding

In order to upskill our staff, we attended a series of professional development sessions on Reading and Phonics. A pamphlet on how to help with reading at home was developed and published

and we started our Whole School Home Reading Program. It was highly successful with students reading more and parents and carers working in partnership with the school to benefit the children. To promote the love of Reading in the school, classes continued a Buddy Reading Program where students took turns to visit their buddy class to read aloud to a chosen buddy.

Writing

Results from the National Assessment Program for Writing Tests showed that Embleton students in Year 3 achieved not only higher than Year students in like schools but also higher than the Year 5 students at our school. This has implications for class placements and staffing in 2019. The Year 3 students




Value Adding

90% of the stable cohort in Year 3 achieved above the National Minimum Standard and achieved satisfactory to good progress. In Year 5, all students in the stable cohort achieved above the National Minimum Standard and also well above the National Mean with 85% of students achieving in the top three bands.

Spelling

Year 3 performed above like schools in Spelling and well above like schools in Year 5. A whole school approach to the teaching of Spelling was developed over the last few years and this has had a significant impact in producing confident and successful spellers as student progress through the school.



Punctuation and Grammar


Grammar and Punctuation results show Year 3 being very close to like schools and the Year 5 significantly above like schools.

Value Adding

An exciting trend with many of the NAPLAN results over the last few years is that there are a number of students achieving in the top bands and less students achieving below the National Standard. This was not the case in 2016 due to the very small numbers of students in the Year 3 and Year 5 cohorts. The trend

of achieving higher levels continued in 2017 as the statistics more accurately reflected achievement of a larger cohort of students at the school level.

The school's performance is measured in Standard Deviations with the modelled expected performance represented as zero. A school's comparative performance needs to be interpreted over a number of years as a variety of factors may lead to a high or low outcome in a single year.

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

Student Progress and Achievement Compared with Like Schools

All learning areas in NAPLAN demonstrated High Progress and High Achievement from Year 3 to Year 5 except for Reading even though Reading is still High Achievement.



Commitment to Improvement

Each year targets of achievement are set after analysis of the data. We have operational plans to address areas in which we can improve even further. The plans detail strategies, resourcing and budgets needed as well as assessing the achievement of the targeted area. The whole school approach to teaching and learning we have at Embleton is testament to our ongoing improvement.

Academic Extension

Cedric and Haeley were accepted into the Year 1 Early Years Extension (EYE) program run by the North Metropolitan Region. The program aims at developing students' critical and creative thinking skills. EYE is part of the Region's Primary Extension and Challenge (PEAC) program. Two of our Year 5 students, Anton and Noah attended the PEAC extension courses this year and did extremely well. Several students in Years 5 and 6 attended different Master Classes at John Forrest Secondary College.



SCIENCE AND SUSTAINABILITY

Science



This year classes continued to use the Primary Connections materials to support their teaching and learning program in the classroom. 2017 also saw the purchase of

additional Primary Connections materials to build our resources. The range of content covered by teachers in their classes in this learning area continued to expand with the senior class who investigated yeast, having a lot of fun baking bread and using their iPad to record the results.

John Patterson was invited in during Science Week in August where students learned about a range of topics including Bernoulli's Principle and how gravity effects moving objects via hands on experiments.

Sustainability

In 2017 the area outside the junior classrooms was cleared and ground cover placed down. The raised beds were planted with a range of vegetables, including beans, carrots and beetroot to name a few and fertilised with worm juice from our worm farms. Students from Room 6 engaged in cooking and health lessons

with help from some enthusiastic pre-service teachers and class volunteers and some very delicious food was produced. Embleton continues to collect and to



recycle waste paper and is looking to formalise this further into 2018 including investigating Water Wise Accreditation.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

Embleton provides a high-quality Kindergarten, Pre-Primary and Junior Primary program in order to give students the best possible start to their educational journey.





SAFE SUPPORTIVE ENVIRONMENT

At Embleton Primary School, we pride ourselves in providing a safe and caring learning environment for students and staff. The nurturing culture at Embleton supports quality learning and positive behaviours.

School Chaplain

Our Pastoral Care Program was enhanced by the appointment of a School Chaplain, Karen Blaq, in 2015. In 2017, Karen provided support by counselling students and families, promoting the Virtues Program as well as providing support both in the playground and in classrooms. Karen conducted regular Social Skills Programs for Years 1-6 and helped to facilitate the UWA Social Workers Practicum. Our Chaplain is an integral part of our school and her work is highly valued.

UWA Social Work Students

Jamie and Lucy from UWA completed their studies at Embleton. They quickly became very involved in all school events and assisted Karen with the Social Skills Program. The girls were part of a lunchtime program which allowed our students to be creative, drawing, colouring in, making paper planes etc. This provided an opportunity for students to talk and share with them. At the end of the practicum they developed and presented a workshop on Trauma Informed Practice in Schools to the staff which was very well received.

In Real Life

Staff in the middle and upper primary attended a course on building resilience and social skills in girls and then implemented the program at the school. The program was so successful that our Deputy Principal was part of a trial for In Real Life for Boys.

Breakfast Club

Our AIEO, Charmaine Thomas has run the Breakfast Club at Embleton for over ten years with boys from Trinity College volunteering to help. Unfortunately, Charmaine was unwell in 2017 and we would not have been able to continue the program without the support of some parents who volunteered their time every Wednesday and Friday mornings. This would not have been possible without the support from Foodbank who also came and conducted workshops where the students prepared and ate deliciously healthy food.

Winter Food Appeal

Families supported Foodbank's School Food Appeal in their fight against hunger by donating healthy winter foods in a can such as soups, canned meals, tuna and other canned fish as well as canned fruits and vegetables.

Healthy Eating

Our school continued to be a part of the Crunch & Sip Program. Students were encouraged to bring vegetables and fruit and drinking water into the classroom and have a short break to eat and drink. The break gave children the opportunity to eat the carrot sticks that might otherwise be left in their lunchbox or not be eaten at all!

RAC Little Legends Incursion

Each class participated in lessons conducted by the RAC Little Legends Club. The RAC Little Legends Club was created to provide community safety (curriculum aligned) lessons to students from Pre-Primary to Year 6 across Western Australia. Topics included Road Safety, Traffic and Road Sense, Bike Safety and Risky Behaviours.

Child Health Nurse

The Department of Health Nurses conducted screening checks for all students new to the school as well as teaching Growth and Development classes for our Year 5/6 students.

Numeracy Day

Visual Arts

An Easter Hat Parade and Easter Raffle, Sausage Sizzles, Mothers and Father's Day Stalls and a Christmas Raffle were some of the fundraising events conducted this year. The highlights of the fundraising events in 2017 were the Book Fair, Lapathon and Embleton Halloween Disco.



Survey.

Student Survey

Twenty-eight students in Years 5 and 6 completed the survey resulting in an overall positive average response of satisfactory to highly satisfactory rating. The responses indicated the highest approval rating for:

- My teachers expect me to do my best.
- Teachers at my school treat students fairly.
- My school looks for ways to improve.
- My school takes students' opinions seriously.
- My teachers are good Teachers.
- My teachers care about me.

There was a marked increase in the school treating students fairly and taking student opinions seriously. However, the following two areas were slightly lower.

- I can talk to my teachers about my concerns.
- Student behaviour is well managed at my school.

Community Survey

This year, we achieved the most responses from our parent group largely due to having the documents translated for those parents with English as a Second Language. The overall rating was extremely strong in relation to all survey items. The three areas which did not achieve as high a rating were:-

- The school takes parents' opinions seriously.
- This school works with me to support my child's learning.

 The school has a strong relationship with the local community.

Staff Survey

The survey was completed by thirteen staff members resulting in nearly 100% satisfactory to highly satisfactory rating for all statements. Staff did not indicate that they strongly agreed or disagreed with any of the statements except for one area.

 This school works with parents to support students' learning.

Upon analysis and discussion of the results of the three surveys, it is evident that there is continual improvement at the school. The areas we will continue to work on are – student/teacher relationships, managing student behaviour and parent involvement in their child's learning as well as relationships with the local community.



FACILITIES

Embleton Primary School enjoys being able to have double classrooms throughout the school as well as a Computer Lab, Art Room, Breakfast Club/Cooking Room, Hall, Undercover Area and a state of the art Library. The grounds are extensive providing ample space for outside activities, sports and interschool events. We had many improvements to the school during the year. These included

- Completion of the Nature Play area outside the Kindy.
- Completion of the Community Playground Project with funds from the Local Projects, Local Jobs Grant, contributions from Durham Road and from the P&C at Embleton.
- Painting of the undercover area with non-slip paint in order to make it safer for the students.
- Establishment of the sensory garden with the help of a grant from Barnardos Australia and Aldi and donations from the Durham Road P&C. The grant enabled us to purchase an elevated sand table for children from both schools to use.





Behaviour Management

A new focus for behaviour management was introduced in the playground in 2017 called Levels of Behaviour. The program is about the whole school having a shared vision of behaviour management with the focus on positive behaviours. Next year, it will be introduced in the classrooms. A significant change in the culture of the school over the last few years is very evident to all who visit Embleton. The students are very polite and well behaved with little administrative intervention needed. The number of suspensions has reduced dramatically.

Whole School Reward

As part of the Behaviour Management Policy, students were traditionally rewarded for good behaviour at the end of each term. As there has been a huge reduction in the number and extent of poor behaviour incidences and an increase in positive behaviours we celebrated an exceptional year and said thanks to the students for all their hard work and effort throughout the year by organising the popular Gymbus.

Attendance

In 2017, attendance rates compared favourably to like schools. Continued promotion of attendance through regular tracking of students at educational risk, ongoing communication with parents and incentives for regular attendance all helped to increase the attendance rate. Regular attendance increased from 66% in 2016 to 71.9% in 2017 which was higher than like schools.

Enrolment Profile

The Embleton area is a sought after area to live. It is close to transport, the Galleria Shopping Centre and to Perth. The suburb is going through an urban renewal phase where large blocks of land are being redeveloped. At the beginning 2014, enrolments increased and another class was created to accommodate new students. With the movement of Year 7's to High School in 2015, the school maintained the original class structure and 136 students were enrolled. In 2016, our initial enrolment was only 116 students but this increased as new families moved into the area and in 2017 we started with 128 students. Next year, enrolments are expected to be over 140.
